

Welcome to Reverend Scott Norwood Witts, our new Group Curate, who has contributed the following article for this edition.:

Reverend Deacon Scott writes...

Being sent as curate to the RNWK group of churches, is a response it seems to being called by God for much of my life. From an awareness in childhood discovered in the blossoming of the family garden, to recognition in the intoxicating atmosphere of nightclubs and bars in my twenties, the response to need and sacrifice experienced in my thirties and the practical engagement in my forties with the bureaucracy of the church, I find myself (following ordination in June) sent again by God s call to proclaim, reveal and enable the Gospel message of Jesus Christ to really mean salvation for all creation.

It s extraordinarily beautiful here. God is present everywhere, in all forms and expressions, in the community of parish and in the land and animals around, in the ugly and unbecoming, in the troubling and painful. In the fullness of the summer and the narrowing of the autumn. My serving of a community really is to the whole community, from the church communities to the people from the parishes, as well as the animals, trees, plants, even the soil which rarely or never enter the church building. From those which delight, to those which present challenge or conflict. I have been sent here to serve all of God s creation, which is all of life and in all of the diverse ways that God reveals himself.

As we came to the end of the Season of Creation in the church calendar, on the 12th October, 9.00 a.m. at the parish church of SS. Peter and Paul in Ridley, we held an Animal Service where we came together in prayer and reflection on the place of non-human animals in our lives; their representation in scripture, their engagement with God and our regard for them as co-creations of God, to which along with all creation, we have been called to be responsible stewards; domesticated animals like those we share our homes with, the farm animals we set to work for us and those which exist in the landscape of the parish are the largest part of our communities, yet they have no say as to how we manage the world that affects us all. We are creations of the same one God and Father, created to share the one earth we all call home in peace and harmony.

This passage from Isaiah draws our attention to the Father's sending of the Son in order to accomplish this:

The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them (Isaiah 11. 6).

Particularly on the 12th of October, the Animal Service encouraged us to bring the animals to church so that we could be together in God s house and experience a truer representation of our parish in the fellowship, prayer and worship our Father calls all of His creation to.





Stewardship Sunday

Below is a slightly edited version of the sermon given by Susan Heads on October 19th.

There are times when I feel I have been cut in half down the middle. I wear two hats – Lay Minister, and PCC Treasurer.

The Lay Minister side of me rocks up in one of our churches on a Sunday morning, and at other times and different places – leading, preaching, taking for granted that the church will be open, others will be on hand to operate the sound, play the organ, sing in the choir, provide tea and coffee, and – when necessary - clean the loos, sweep the floor, and do the countless other things that go on around us, that make our services, usually, run like clockwork

The Treasurer side of me worries about the heating and lighting bills, for this building and the rectory, the regular payments to the Diocese...... The PCC works on an annual budget close to £60,000 for the year, £5000 a month, just to tick over. Of that, so far this year, we have spent just over £400 on "Mission"; the bulk of the money just covers the bills. We are just about on budget to break even this year, providing nothing drastic goes wrong between now and the end of the year. To quote Mr Micawber in Charles Dickens 'David Copperfield "Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen pounds nineteen and six, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds and six pence, result misery."

During our services on the 19 October we looked at 2 passages from Luke's gospel, in the first passage (Luke 20: 45 - 47) Jesus metaphorically points his finger at the scribes, who love to walk around in fine robes, love the greetings in the market, and sit in the chief seats in the synagogue. They were not allowed to be paid for their teaching, they were supposed to have a trade and work for their living, but for someone in the community to support a rabbi was an act of great piety. Jesus criticises unscrupulous rabbis who used their position of trust to further their own ends, and pander to their own material comforts at the expense of vulnerable and impressionable widows – who generously gave these rabbis a free home. These rabbis were supposed to give generously of their time in teaching, but they cynically abused the position, for their own comfort and benefit.

The second story (Luke 21:1-4) about the "Widow's mite" is one with which we are probably all familiar. In the Court of the Women in the Temple there were 13 collecting boxes known as trumpets. They were shaped like trumpets with the narrow part at the top and the wider part at the foot. Each was assigned to offerings for a different purpose, for the word that was used to burn the sacrifice, for the incense that was burned on the altar, for the upkeep of the golden vessels and so on. Jesus sees people flinging their offerings into the trumpets, and then came the poor widow. All she had in the world was two small coins, that were the smallest of all coins both in size and in value (I suppose we would liken them to 1p pieces). The offering made by this widow was almost as small as it could possibly be, but Jesus said that it far out valued the other offerings because it was everything she had.

Two things determine the value of any gift:-

Firstly, there is the spirit in which it is given. A gift which is extracted unwillingly; a gift which is given with a grudge; a gift that is given for the sake of prestige or self display is not really a gift at all. The only real gift that has value, is that which is given freely, with a loving heart.

Secondly, the gift involves a sacrifice. A gift that is a mere trifle to one person may be a vast sum to another. The gifts of the rich, as they flung their offerings into the trumpets, did not really cost them much. They may have carefully calculated how much they could afford, without impacting on their own lifestyle. The widow gave with a reckless generosity – she could give no more.

In other words, it's not what you do, it's the way that you do it. (Cont...)

What do we mean, when we think about generosity, in ourselves or each other? And generosity is not just about money.

There is nothing generous about an unscrupulous rabbi/scribe giving freely of his time in teaching, if his underlying motive is to win prestige, adulation in the market place, and a comfortable roof over his head.

I might, conceitedly, consider I am being generous with my time every time I turn up on a Sunday morning to take a service, but am I being generous if, when I am writing my sermon, I am wondering whether Simon will give it a high mark, or will feel annoyed and upset when he says it's only a mediocre offering this week?

When Simon and I are counting out the collection money at the end of the month, am I being cynical when I mutter to myself that there was not as much as we would have liked, knowing that I could easily afford to pop some more money in the plate myself, and not notice the difference?

We have as we all know been in vacancy since Helen left at the end of April. There are 218 parishes in Rochester Diocese. Of that number, 38 parishes are in vacancy at the moment - Ash and Ridley count as 2 in that statistic - with another 7 going into vacancy by the end of the year. Bishop Jonathan said recently that when he was ordained in 1989, there were 11,000 stipendiary priests in the Church of England: there are currently 7,500. If current training and ordination levels of 400 a year can be maintained, which is by no means certain, there will be nearer 5,500 by the mid 2030s. We must be prepared that we will have quite a wait until we can welcome a new Rector to Ash and Ridley.

I would like us too to think about our own acts of generosity, and the intentionality of all we do, in our church life and every aspect of our lives, because - supported by the Holy Spirit, it is mutual generosity, love and self-giving that will be the glue that holds us together, and hopefully enables God's work in this parish, not just to tick over, but to thrive in the weeks and months ahead.

- A journey on the Camino de Santiago -

In the middle of August I had the privilege to walk a section of the Camino de Santiago, a centuries

old pilgrimage route across northwest Spain. Over six days I journeyed around 115k from Sarria to Santiago de Compostela, carrying not only a backpack but also a few burdens, prayers and an open heart. I set and followed a devotional plan that gave each day a *theme*, a short scripture reading, and a prayer focus. What struck me is that each day's theme intertwined deeply with my physical experience.

Day 1. Letting Go & Setting My Intention - As I took my first steps, initially in the wrong direction which quickly switched on my sense of humour, it also caused my path to cross with others and have conversations that I wouldn't have had otherwise. That early detour was



a small but significant reminder that guidance often comes from our missteps. I reflected on past phases of my life and felt a deep gratitude for God's faithfulness through the seasons. Towards the last section of the walk I sensed an invitation to let go of guilt over missed opportunities to walk with Him in the past, trusting that His timing is perfect.

Day 2. Repentance & Mercy - This was a tougher day, physically and emotionally. As I walked through the forests of pine trees and watched the clouds roll across the sunrise, I envisioned Jesus walking beside me, lifting my burdens and renewing my spirit. This was a day of quiet reflection and confession, in the stillness I felt the gentle mercy that calls us forward in love. Day 3. Trust and Surrender - On this day I learnt to 'walk by faith, not by sight' focusing not only on the imagery of the beautiful cathedrals and sacred places, but on the unseen love of God that sustains and brings peace. Day 4. Gratitude & Wonder - Something had shifted, I began to notice God in everything, the beauty of nature, the kindness of strangers, the laughter of others, and the gift of slowing down. Day 5. Compassion & Service - Pilgrimage is never just about yourself, for me it was walking alongside others, sharing stories, encouragement or the odd squashed banana from a backpack. The small moments of connection were a reminder that service isn't always grand gestures, sometimes it's a listening ear, slowing down to walk with someone for a while, or saying "Buen Camino!" to a passing pilgrim. Each interaction was a reminder we are not meant to walk alone, compassion can simply be presence. Day 6. Arrival & Union - Arriving in Santiago felt like coming home, it moved me to tears. Not only had I finished quite a long walk, but I felt renewed, I had a deep sense of peace that went beyond the physical achievement. I felt united with God, with others and with a journey that is still yet to come..

Walking the Camino reminded me that pilgrimage isn't just about the distant destination and the physical distance you walk, its about opening your heart to God's presence right where you are now. You don't need to walk 100+km to go on a pilgrimage, it can be quiet prayer walk, time in Scripture, or seeing your daily life as a journey with Jesus.

For me, the Camino was a time of renewal, I have returned with a lighter heart, a clearer mind, and a deep sense of God's peace. My ending prayer is that each of us, in our own way, can experience that same closeness with Christ by taking small steps of Faith each day.

ECO CHURCH IDEAS FOR THE WINTER

Tin Can Bee Hotels – Fix an old tin to a fence or wall and pack it with dried hollow plant stems from 1mm to 12 mm in diameter to attract a range of bees.

Plant Tray Bird Bath – Fill an old plant pot tray with water to make a bird bath. Stand it on old bricks to raise it from the ground or leave it low to provide water for hedgehogs.

Old Sink Pond — An old baby bath makes an attractive mini container pond. Pile up logs or stones to make sure wildlife can get in and out safely.

Pallet Herb Garden – An upturned pallet can add height to your garden. You can paint it a nice colour and simply wedge in plants in their pots between the slats.

Grow Plants in Saucepans – Drill holes in old saucepans and other kitchen containers to make plane pots. They are perfect for salad crops such as lettuce and radish, plus herbs such as chives and parsley.

Restoring Choughs to Kent. – The plan is to release young Choughs each year and support these birds in establishing a self- sustaining wild

population in Kent. This restoration will also benefit other species such as bats, birds, and some rare butterflies in these restored areas.
